A busy summer

The sun has well and truly shone on our first harvesting season and, with the help of our fantastic volunteers, we have collected over 1300kg of mixed wildflower seed from 18 different donor sites across the Cotswolds. The majority of this has now been spread (largely by hand!) on a wide range of recipient sites from village verges and school playing fields to large agricultural fields. We have more than doubled our 2019 target of 25 hectares restored, and can't wait to start seeing the results next spring.

We are now looking for new donor or recipient sites, small or large, so if you know of anywhere which may be suitable, please do get in touch.

Reaping the rewards

Wildflower grassland is important in so many ways. This summer, we discovered the botanical diversity at some of these grassland sites was incredible (we recorded a total of

218 species of flowering plants in our botanical surveys this year, with one of our donor sites alone having 95 species). For me though, it was the insect abundance that was been the real eye-opener. Our donor sites were all, without exception, teeming with invertebrates; from micro moths to giant crickets – in stark contrast to the mown lawns and 'improved' agricultural grasslands which are so often the norm. Our hope is that by restoring these wildflower grasslands we are not just helping conserve the wildflowers, but also all the animals that depend on them - our insect pollinators, mammals such as voles and bats, and birds such as skylark, kestrel and barn owl.
