Published by the Cotswolds Conservation Board, this guide is designed to help you get out of the car, and into your hiking boots, or onto a bike, horse, bus, or train across the Cotswolds. We've included information to help you plan your trip, highlighted some attractions you might enjoy and provided ideas for walking, cycling, or sightseeing days.

Around 2,000 square kilometers to explore!

The Cotswolds attracts visitors all year round who are drawn to the area by its rural charm, rolling countryside, picture postcard villages, and vibrant market towns. Human history in the Cotswolds goes back thousands of years - today's explorers can still find the remains of Neolithic long barrows and Iron Age hill forts. The region is perfect for walking, cycling, and riding or simply enjoying a relaxing day out or short break.

Explore Northern Cotswolds

The northern Cotswolds is home to many of the market towns made famous by wool trading.

Chipping Campden, Stow-on the-Wold, Burford, Moreton-in-Marsh, Tetbury, and Northleach are all famous for the medieval history of the wool trade.

The northern landscape is formed of rolling hills, criss-crossed by Roman roads and the dry stone walls which originally kept in the sheep. Spectacular views can be found from Bredon Hill, Sudeley Castle, Stow-on-the-Wold and Cleeve Hill.





Trading towns

Travelling from London or Oxford? Why not make your first stop the market town of Moreton-in-Marsh with a train ride of around an hour or so station to station?

Hop off there, enjoy a coffee and a stroll around the town's art galleries, before jumping on a bus for a short bus ride to Stow-on-the-Wold (the highest town in the Cotswolds).

Then continuing by bus, travel on to Bourton-on-the-Water to enjoy famously good fish and chips with a river view.

After Bourton, you could jump back on a bus to hop just over the AONB border into the Regency town of Cheltenham, or to Cirencester - often referred to as the capital of the Cotswolds.






Explore Central Cotswolds

Cirencester is a perfect starting point for a couple of days of exploring, with lots of rail routes coming into Kemble, the nearest station and just a few miles from town. Catch a bus into Cirencester and take in the sights for a few hours, then hop on a bus from town into bohemian Stroud to explore their farmers' market, and arts and music events.

Alternatively take a train from Kemble to continue your journey by rail on to Stroud and finish your day in this beautiful market town. Stay the night at one of the quaint inns or a hotel then in the morning, head over to Painswick village by bus and enjoy strolling around this historic wool town in the Cotswold hills. Buildings date from the 14th century, so your trip will be steeped in history.



Woodchester Mansion & Park

A Grade I listed 19th Century Victorian Gothic mansion which was mysteriously abandoned mid-construction in 1873.



Cleeve Hill & Common

At 330 metres, Cleeve Hill and Common is the highest point of the Cotswolds and designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest.

Saddle Up

The Cotswolds has always been popular with horse riders – and many stables and schools offer hacks that will take riders out across the landscape and through the charming villages the region is famous for.

The Rollright Stones
